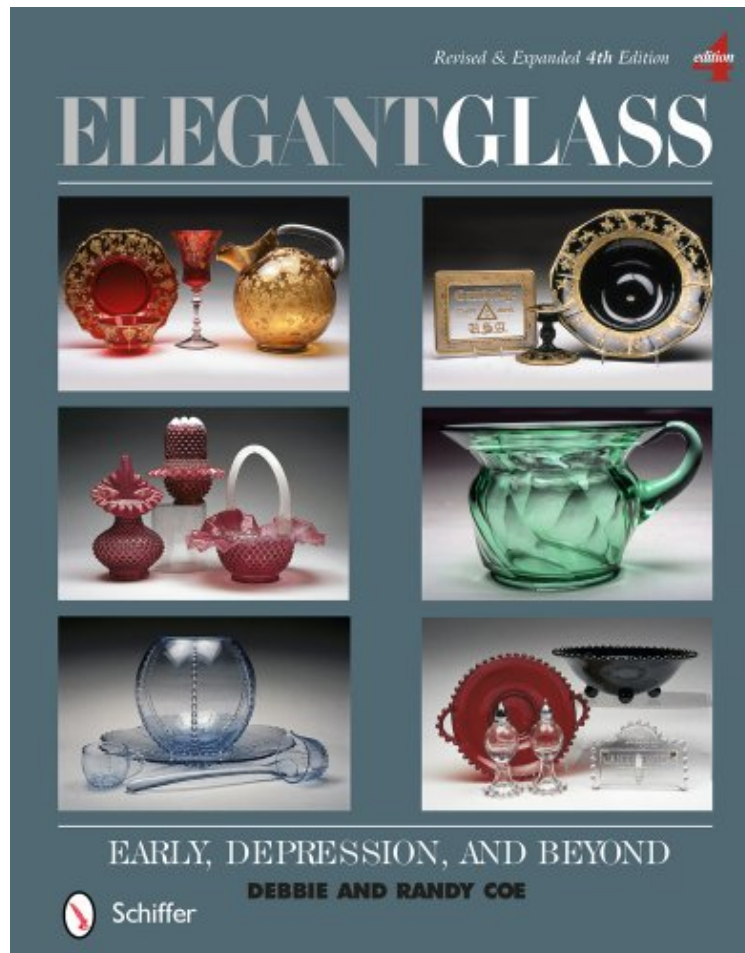

Over 1000 beautiful color photos display a wide spectrum of *Elegant Glass* patterns, colors, shapes, and etchings. The book's listings are updated and over 100 patterns of elegant American glass are represented in this new 4th edition.

Several patterns have additional listings. Each pattern includes a complete listing of all known pieces made. Detailed descriptions are given for each item listed. Captions include descriptions of each piece pictured. The major companies of Cambridge, Fenton, Fostoria, Heisey, Imperial, Morgantown, New Martinsville, and Paden City are represented, along with their most popular patterns. Introductions to each pattern include production dates, pattern and/or etching numbers, and original company colors. Full lines of dinnerware and their companion patterns are listed, along with bedroom, bath, and decorating pieces. Aiding collectors in identifying patterns, a detailed image of each etching is provided in every description. Collector resources, a detailed bibliography, and a glossary complete this thorough guide.

About the Author Debbie Randy Coe are long time collectors and dealers in American glassware. They started dealing in antiques in 1980 and by 1986 were full time antique dealers. Their first book was on Elegant Glass followed by: Liberty Blue Dinnerware, Glass Animals Figurines, Avon Cape Cod, Fenton Glass Burmese, Fenton Basket Patterns Acanthus to Hummingbird, Fenton Basket Patterns Innovation to Wisteria, Animal Pitchers, Colors of Heisey, Corning Pyroceram Cookware and Fenton Art Glass- A Centennial of Glass Making 1907 to 2007. They are contributing advisors to the glass magazine of, All About Glass, being published by the West Virginia Museum of American Glass. They also write a column for the national newsletter of The World of Antiques and Collectibles that is published by the Antiques Collectibles National Association. In addition they also write columns for Old Stuff, a Pacific NW regional antique newspaper. At many antique shows on the west coast, Randy provides assistance at the Identification Booths. Both Debbie and Randy also conduct various seminars during the year to educate the public on American made glass and china.
