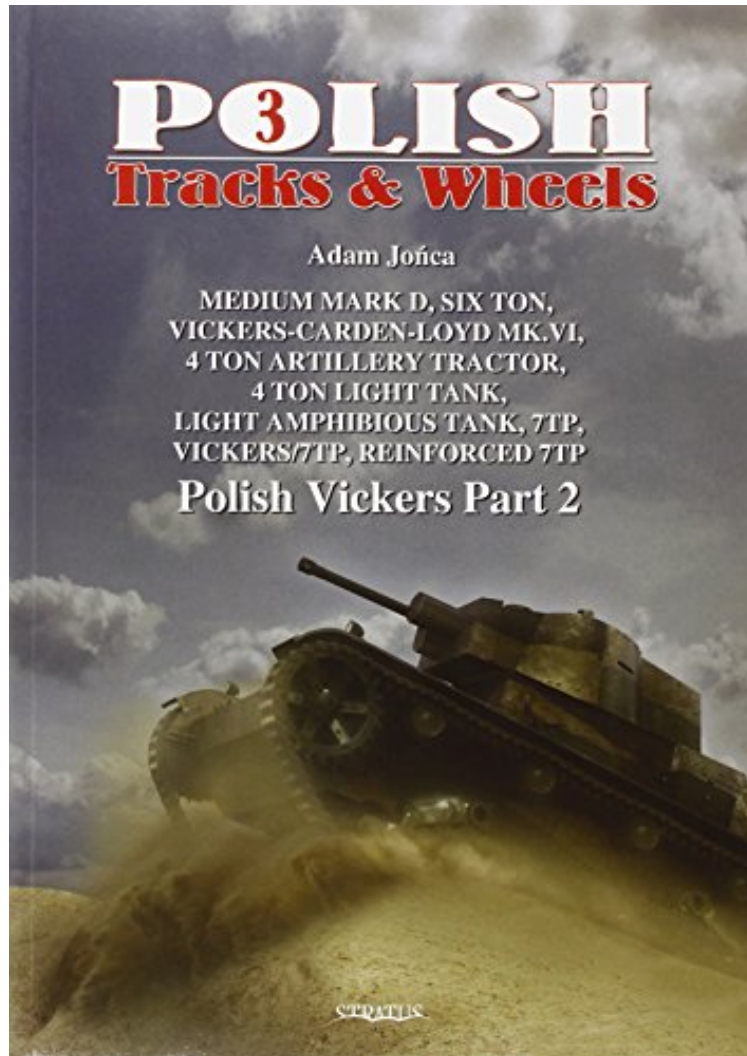

Polish tanks from a British design By John Matlock I found this to be one of the more interesting books on armor that I have read, and for several reasons. 1. There is an often repeated story that the Polish cavalry attempted to attack German armored forces using only their lances. This book has a section showing Polish armor that was in action against the Germans during their 1939 invasion. Some of their armor was even locally produced. 2. For various reasons the Polish military liked the British armor built by Vickers. This book talks about the Vickers tanks being modified for and later by Poland in the years between the two world wars. There is as much information about Vickers tanks here as in any book I've seen. 3. As part of the German invasion of Poland, Russia also invaded from the East as part of their agreement with Germany. Russian forces captured five Polish tanks, all damaged showing that the Polish forces did not fall apart without fighting. The Russians managed to get one of the tanks running and experimented with it to determine the differences between the Polish tanks and the Russian T-26 (The more famous Russian T-34 wasn't out in 1939). The Russian found that the Polish tank offered several advantages over the T-26, including: The track links were a better design, The ground pressure was less, The main clutch was superior, Polish armor steel was better. It would be interesting to know if and how these points were used in the T-34 design.

Complementing the well-established and successful "Polish Wings" series on aircraft of the Polish Air Force, this book is the second in a series on Polish army vehicles. It tells the story of four major tanks of British origin used by the Polish army in the 1930s, some still in use at the time of the German invasion. Training and operations with these tanks are described and illustrated, with many photos and full color artwork. Color schemes and markings are described and illustrated.
