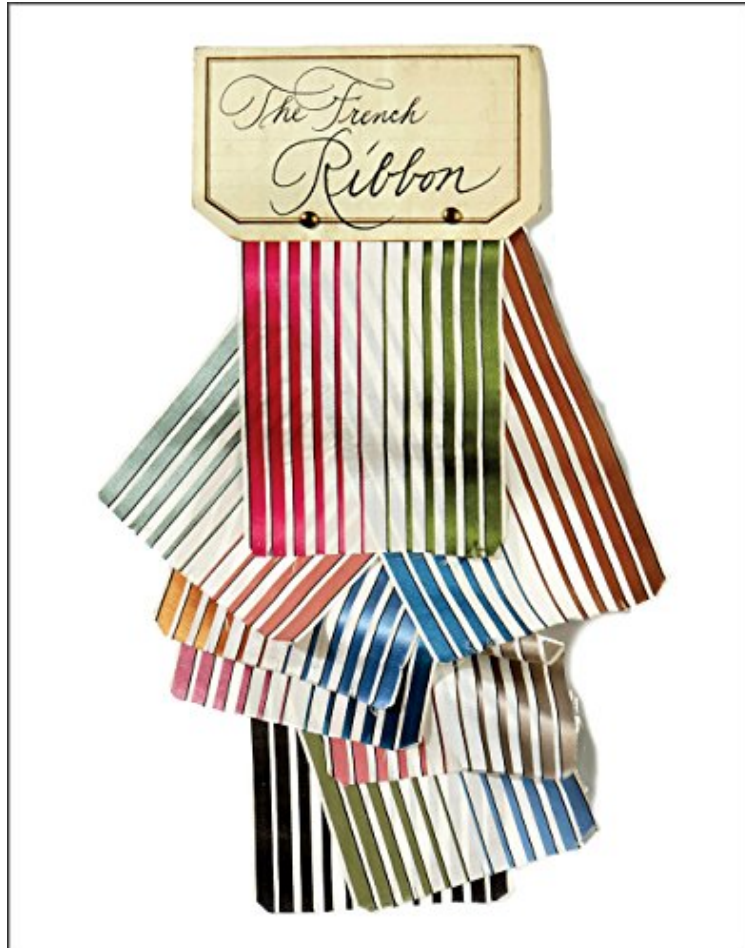


The French Ribbon
